

A MESSAGE FROM MR. HERR



I grew up on a farm and would often watch my dad work on things. It may have been something as simple as fixing a fence, mechanical work on a tractor or possibly welding a piece of metal on one of the many implements on the farm. More often than not, the tools he used served multiple purposes. Take a hammer for example. It pounds nails, right? Well, yes but it also can pull nails, rivets, bend metal, strike masonry drills and steel chisels and so on. I've even seen a hammer used as a make-shift screwdriver! The point is, while a tool has an intended use, more often it can be made useful in other ways.

Learning happens in a classroom. However, much like a hammer doesn't just pound nails, learning doesn't just happen in a classroom. It happens outside, in social situations such as the cafeteria, on the baseball field or track. If you think about it, we learn things in just about every situation and those experiences help to shape who we are.

The best education comes from a team effort between the school and home. It is up to both of us to provide experiences our children can learn from to form their own opinions on important topics within our community, county, state and beyond.

Small things in the family unit make a big difference; things such as house and car maintenance, reading, exercising, eating healthy, prioritizing time, voting and using a proper choice of words around children. I know that you know, this list is not exhaustive.

At school the small things also make a big difference. Our students take a significant number of field trips during the last few months before summer break. Last month the 6th graders traveled to an outdoor education camp (Michindoh). The juniors and seniors took a class trip to New York City. The 8th graders took their annual trip to Washington DC. Teachers plan culminating projects that tap into student interests. Students go to the Public library to check out books or take part in fun activities. There is a blend of routine and surprise in classrooms this time of year. Not every learning experience is a positive one but I'd argue that learning can be more powerful when the outcome isn't what was expected.

Each day is an opportunity to grow. Each day is an opportunity to learn something new. So, let's pick up the proverbial hammer and get to work!


